 - Reduce administrative burden for providers.
 - Promote inclusive, multilingual services.
- Notable Quote: "Your attachment to primary care should be as automatic as the way our children are assigned to public schools..."
- Legislative Milestone: Highlighted the Primary Care Act Ontario's first.
- Call to Action:
 - Collaborate with Ontario Health Teams.
 - Share insights to shape a stronger, connected system.

Every child should be connected to a primary care health professional early – no one left behind

Integrated, Seamless Care

Families need a consistent care team, navigation support, and smooth transitions supported by relationships and shared digital systems.

Support for Primary Care Health Professionals

Primary care teams need streamlined systems, resource hubs, and enhanced tools like 1Call1Click to focus more on care and less on admin.

Equity & Inclusion

Care must be accessible, culturally safe, and inclusive, especially for underserved, newcomer, and Indigenous communities.

Newborn Strategy – A Call to Action

A coordinated approach is needed to ensure all newborns are attached to care at birth and supported through early outreach.

Station 1: Connecting Children and Youth to Primary Care Teams

Prompt:

 What practical steps can Kids Come First take to help more children and youth get connected to a primary care team?

• Highlights:

- Centralized intake and matchmaking
- Community outreach via schools and community groups
- Use of QR codes and multilingual materials
- While full attachment remains the long-term goal, there is a need for short-term, collaborative solutions to support unattached children and families during the transition period

Station 2: Making Primary Care More Connected and Convenient

Prompt:

 What would it look like if primary care for children and families was truly seamless, from hospital to home to community?

• Highlights:

- Single point of contact for families
- Province-wide EHR and vaccine registry
- Services embedded in schools and daycares

Station 3: Supporting Primary Care Health Professionals

Prompt:

 What can Kids Come First do to support primary care professionals so they can focus more on care and less on admin?

Highlights:

- Admin support and AI tools
- Pediatric consult hubs and resource centers
- Enhance tools like 1Call1Click to facilitate access to care

Station 4: Healthy Starts for Newborns

Prompt:

 How can we ensure every newborn gets the right care in the right place, especially those facing barriers?

• Highlights:

- Automatic attachment at birth
- Home visits, rural outreach, prenatal engagement
- Explore short-term care pathways, like newborn clinics, for infants not yet attached to a primary care provider.
- Language access and culturally sensitive care
