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Celebrating Kids Come First Achievements



The Kids Come First Health Team continues to grow its membership with the inclusion of all Public Health Units in the Champlain Region:

Ongoing Pediatric Home and Community Care transformation including the launch of the Centre of Excellence in Pediatric Home and Community Care: Pediatric Home and Community Care - Kids Come First. Since the transfer of pediatric home and community care services for children and youth in the Champlain region, families of kids with complex medical care needs have reported marked improvements in school and home care connectivity and smoother transitions from hospital to home.

Linda Tabet is willing to sacrifice her own health to make sure her daughter, Chloe, gets the care she needs. She just wishes it didn't happen so often.



"As Francophones, we tend to speak in English if we are bilingual to make things easier. If we insisted more, it could make a difference. When they see that we speak in English, they take it as an excuse to offer services in English only. We underestimate the number of people who speak French, even if they are not super comfortable. We were sent someone who speaks French at home, but she was really struggling. We insisted that she speak French to our child, even though it wasn't perfect. Sometimes we don't insist enough."

"The forms are often in English. I always have to translate for Mom who doesn't speak English."

"A simple place to start, and what we've heard from families, is that consistently making an upfront offer of French-language provision of care would go a long way. Families are often not aware that an organization has Francophone care providers," said Hélène Fournier, Executive Director at Valoris for Children and Adults of Prescott-Russell.

The launch of the **Francophone Report** Portrait of health service needs for francophone children and youth and their families and Interactive Platform which provides information on available services in French across the region. Led by the Francophone working group of Kids Come First, this new system capacity report is the result of public consultation and the evaluation of existing French-language health services offered by 40 local organizations highlighting 10 recommendations that formed the work plan.



The completion of the three phases of the implementation plan of Kids Come First 1Call1Click.ca regional coordinated access, navigation and clinical services inclusive of the integration of the Mental Health Addiction Nurses (MHAN) Program by the Mental Health, Addiction & Substance Use Health (MHASUH) Working Group. The launch of care coordination for complex needs, the MHAN program integration, and establishing and sharing our trilogy of dashboards were key activities in the last year.

- Is due for recommended vaccinations:
- Does not have a family physician or pediatrician or a Primary Health Care nurse practitioner (PHC-NP)* or cannot easily access or see their family physician, pediatrician, or PHC-NP.

This table consists of youth, families, and caregivers with lived experience receiving health and developmental services in the region helping us to transform care delivery systems for children and youth.












The Kids Come First Health Team developed a communication plan for 2022-23 and launched its social media platforms to increase awareness and reach.



Launch of our Kids Come First Linguistic Protocol

To winning strategies, and beyond!

- Kids Come First Heath team and the French Language Health Services Network of Eastern Ontario

WHY?

Kids Come First Health Team is committed to providing health care services in French to its entire Francophone population. It recognizes the importance of serving children and their families in the official language in which they are most comfortable in order to ensure the QUALITY, SAFETY and EFFICIENCY of their care.

To achieve this, Kids Come First has adopted a COMMON, SIMPLE and EFFECTIVE linguistic protocol. To facilitate its implementation, a toolbox and two training courses (The Active Offer of French Language Health Services and Implementation of Winning Strategies) are available to its partners.

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WINNING STRATEGIES to provide services to Francophone clients

Identify Francophone clients

From your first contact with the client ask the following questions:

- 1) What is your mother tongue?
- 2) If your mother tongue is neither English nor French, in which Canada's official languages are you most comfortable?
- 3) In which language are you most comfortable receiving your health care services?
- 4) Include the information in the client's file:
- 5) Develop a process that allows all members of your staff in direct contact with clients to know the language in which they are most comfortable receiving services.

Identify staff members able to provide services in French

- 1) Ask your staff to complete a self-assessment of their French language proficiency and include it in their file:
- 2) Formally evaluate, through internal mechanisms or an external firm, all employees who report a level of French that is equal to or higher than the perfectible advanced level;
- Maintain an up-to-date list of your staff with French language proficiency;
- 4) Encourage your staff with French language skills to wear "Je parle français" identification.



¹ French oral proficiency levels are from the Ontario Ministry of Francophone Affairs

Match Francophone clients with staff members able to provide services in French

- Define a process to match
 Francophone clients with staff
 members able to provide services in
 French;
- 2) Define contingency measures when there are no staff members able to provide services in French for the service requested.

Refer clients who are more comfortable receiving their services in French to another provider who offers the same quality services in French

Develop a formal referral agreement for Francophone clients with one or more health service providers offering the same quality services in French.

Measure results

Key indicators:

- % of clients whose mother tongue is French;
- % of clients who are more comfortable receiving their health care services in French;
- % of staff members able to provide services in French;
- % of Francophone served in French:
- % of clients referred for French language health services externally:
- % of clients satisfied with the services



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Adopting and implementing the winning strategies will turn you into superheroes...

Because superheroes work in teams to be stronger just as the winning strategies were developed to limit working in silos and to advocate for more collaboration among the Kids Come First partners, for the well-being of Francophone patients.

Because superheroes help the most vulnerable just as the winning strategies aim to help Francophone children and their families living in a linguistic minority context to receive healthcare services in their mother tongue.

Because superheroes put their protegees at the center of their action just as the winning strategies in the linguistic protocol are designed to place the Francophone patient at the heart of the action by considering the language in which he or she is most comfortable, and by actively offering services in French, even when the language is not mastered by all the personnel, because it's the right thing to do.
